

| Model | Description | Uses/Pros | Cons/Cautions |

| One Teaching /One Assisting | Students in a single group. One teacher leads instruction as the other circulates to answer questions, reinforce concepts, refocus attention... | | |
| One Teaching/ One Gathering Data | One teacher leads instruction; one teacher gathers observational data on one student, one group of students, or the entire class. | | |
| Station Teaching | Students rotate through two or more stations. Each teacher facilitates a station; other stations are independent. Students can rotate through all the stations or only visit certain stations. | | |
| Team/ Interactive Teaching | Students remain in 1 group; teachers co-instruct w/ one modeling, demonstrating, etc. Teachers can also switch roles periodically (Interactive). | | |
| Parallel Teaching | Students in two groups. Each teacher works with a group. Sometimes, the teachers do identical work (e.g., test review), and sometimes different (e.g., different texts, two different strategies). | | |
| Alternative Teaching | Most students remain with one teacher, while the other teacher instructs a small-group for re-teaching, assessment, enrichment, extension, pre-teaching, or another purpose. The small group can be teacher or student-selected. | | |
